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
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## **NEED AND DESIRABILITY**

## PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT OF ERF 301, WHITES ROAD, HOEKWIL (WILDERNESS HEIGHTS) GEORGE MUNICIPALITY, WESTERN CAPE.

Erf 301 Hoekwil is a vacant smallholding of 3.92ha in extent, located in Hoekwil (Wilderness Heights). The property overlooks the Touw River and Ebb & Flow Rest Camp (Garden Route National Park) to the east, and the Village of Wilderness to the west. Access to the property is from Whites Road leading from the Village around the Wilderness Heights area with a circular route from the west to east and again reaching Heights Road in the west. The section of Whites Road passing Erf 301 Hoekwil is a provincial road, Divisional Road 1621.

The proposal is for the development of a single residential dwelling with six (6) smaller guest units called "Pods". The 3-bedroom primary dwelling (446 m<sup>2</sup>) is positioned centrally on the property as close as possible to Whites Road to the north, with four (4) of the Pods ( $\pm 50 \text{ m}^2 \text{ each}$ ) to the west of it and another two (2) Pods directly south. The development footprint is approximately 1 638 m<sup>2</sup>.

How will this development (and its separate elements/aspects) impact on the ecological integrity of the area?	The development will impact on Thicket vegetation as identified by the botanical specialist.
	The Botanical and Terrestrial Biodiversity Impact Assessment compiled by Confluent Environmental determined that the "Thicket with some patches of overgrown fynbos" habitat on the site has a low terrestrial biodiversity and plant theme sensitivity.
	The thicket on the site is not part of a CR ecosystem, and it is not consistent with Garden Route Granite Fynbos for all the reasons mentioned in this report. The aspect of the thicket is on a south facing slope, and fire is unlikely to affect the vegetation here, making all the fynbos elements unviable for conservation efforts. Furthermore, the presence of fynbos nearby, on slope crests and north-facing slopes mean that fynbos seeds are present in the landscape. Fynbos will therefore start to colonise open canopy areas in thicket and forest but are unlikely to remain as thicket pioneer species start to outcompete them.
	No threatened or near threatened plant species were recorded in this vegetation type on the site. Only one protected LC tree species ( <i>Pittosporum viridiflorum</i> , I.e., cheesewoods) was observed in this area, which means that the owner of Erf 301 will need to obtain the relevant forestry license to manage or trim these trees. The overgrown sections of fynbos are unlikely to support SCC.

Whites Road and also Waterside Road located to the south, are tourism routes which will be supported by this development proposal Erf 301 Hoekwil (Wilderness Heights). The GMSDF states that Open Space Zone III is encouraged in CBA/ESA areas and where steep slopes are found. Erf 301 Hoekwil is also located abutting the Wilderness Lakes Protected Area of the Environmental attributes management and Garden Route National Park. Properties surrounding the Garden Route National Park are slowly reflecting the character of the area and the importance of its location. Through appropriate management the natural environment of this property is being restored. The proposed zoning complements the Wilderness National Park (part of the Garden Route National Park). The limited number of tourist accommodation units will also provide access to the Wilderness character & sense of place. Importantly, the skyline will not be negatively affected as shown in the supporting documentation. All aspects have been addressed in the BAR and EMPr, with associated mitigation measures. Specialist studies were conducted that recommended mitigation measures in regard to the negative impacts on the receiving environment.

General waste generated through the construction and operational phase of the project is the responsibility of the contractor / landowner. Refuse such as container bags, gravel, rubble, cans, plastic, wire, etc. generated during the execution of any works must be separated out and stored in appropriately designated areas, removed on a regular basis for disposal at a permitted waste disposal site. All recyclable waste must be separated out with separate containers for paper products, glass, plastic, etc.

Any <u>possible</u> hazardous waste generated on the site during construction must be kept in a suitably bunded area and removed appropriately.
